The OERu makes higher education accessible to everyone. Coordinated by the OER Foundation (OERF), an independent, not-for-profit organisation, the OERu network of institutions offers free online courses for students worldwide. The OERu partners also provide affordable ways for learners to gain academic credit towards qualifications from recognised institutions.

Origins

The OER Foundation (OERF) was established in 2009 – with the goal of using open education as a means to provide leadership and international networking, as well as supporting educational institutions to achieve their strategic objectives.

The OER Foundation hosts WikiEducator, a flagship community of +65,000 educators, which focuses on being able to share knowledge freely.

In February 2011, with funding support from UNESCO, an open meeting was convened to explore the establishment of the OERu. The meeting's aim was to build a parallel learning universe, in order to widen access to more affordable education for learners excluded from the traditional tertiary education system. In November of the same year, the founding OERu anchor partners commenced planning for the implementation of the OERu network.

Today, OERF hosts an OERu network that includes recognised universities, polytechnics and community colleges from five continents. A full list of OERu partners can be found here - <http://oeru.org/oeru-partners>.

OERu Description

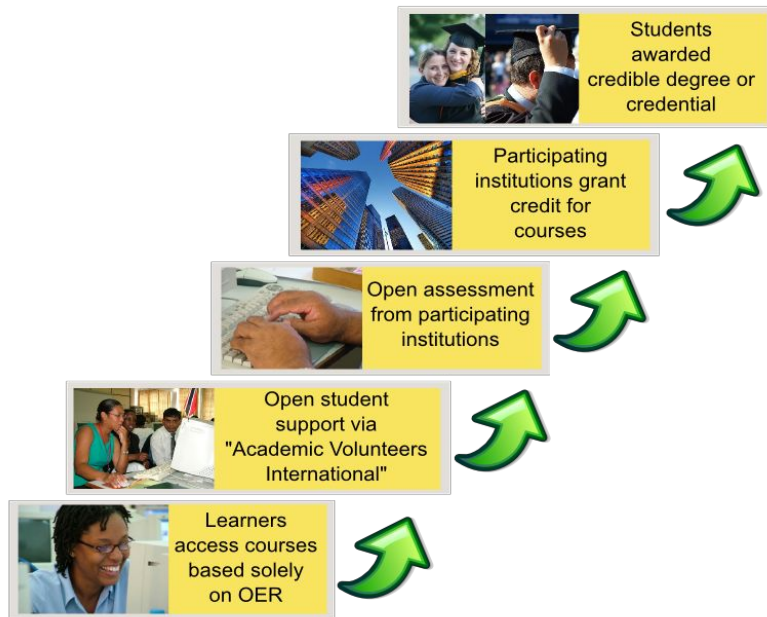


Figure 1: OERu Concept

The OERu aims to create a sustainable innovation partnership between accredited educational institutions which will provide free learning to all learners with pathways to gain academic credit from formal education institutions around the world. It is based on the community service and outreach missions of tertiary education providers to develop parallel delivery systems (now possible with the open web and free content licensing of learning materials) that will augment existing educational provision. Figure 1 shows the OERu concept depicting a stairway to success for OER learners.

The OERu is an open network and public-private partnership (PPP) including post-secondary institutions, the private sector, non-profits, government and international agencies. This OER ecosystem aims to serve both formal and informal learners by creating more flexible and affordable pathways to meet diverse student needs.

The OERu collaboration:

- Will design and implement a parallel learning universe to provide free learning opportunities for all students worldwide with pathways to earn credible post-secondary credentials.
- Offer courses and programs based solely on OER and open textbooks.
- Design and implement scalable pedagogies appropriate for the OERu concept.
- Will implement scalable systems of volunteer student support through community service learning approaches.
- Coordinate assessment and credentialing services on a cost recovery basis for participating education institutions to ensure credible qualifications and corresponding course articulation among anchor partners.

Openness

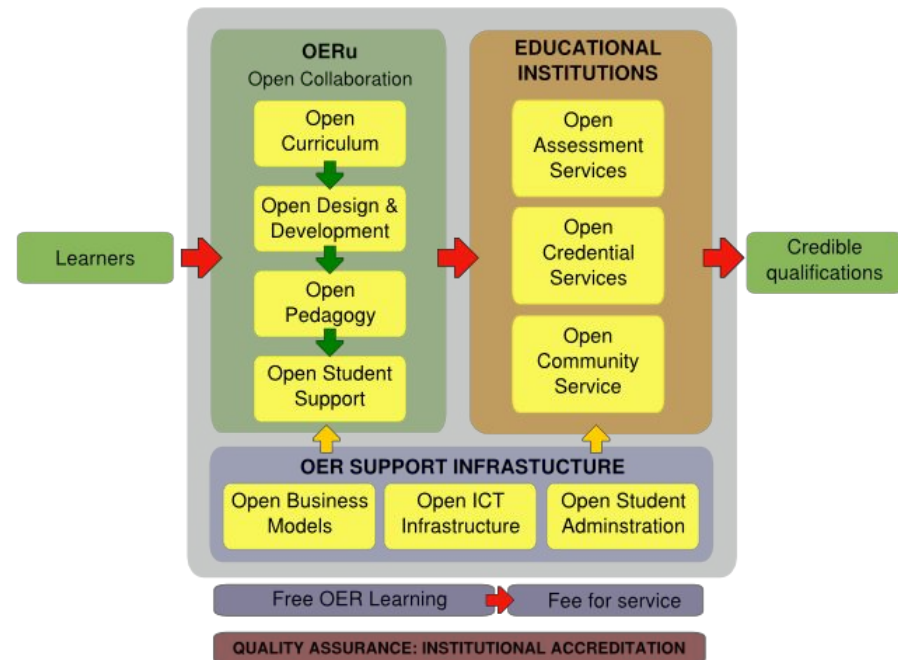


Figure 2: OERu Logic Model

The OERu is distinctively open in that it incorporates openness in everything it does as shown in Figure 2.

The distinctively open aspects of the OERu, include its use of open-source software, open peer review, open public input, open file formats, open practices, and Open Educational Resources.

Inputs for OERu's logic model include, existing open content, open textbooks, open access journals, open courseware, OER, and open source software infrastructure. The OER logic model is designed to address the current gaps in the OER ecosystem including open curriculum, open student support, open assessment and open accreditation.

Educational content OERu uses and develops are all licensed with Creative Commons.

Open Business Models

OERu's Logic Model has always included open business models. However, the early years of OERu were focused on establishing a critical mass of global partners and initial course offerings. Work to establish open business models for the whole initiative didn't get seriously underway until 2015 with the launch of the Creative Commons open business models initiative.

The first open business model component to be built out was that for the OERF which is the host organization for the OERu. Here's the latest OERF open business model canvas:

OERF Business Model Analysis

The OERF has very strong value propositions - all based on the benefits and value OER brings.

Offering education to learners at zero cost requires OERu and its partners to devise business models different from those by which higher education typically operates.

The OERF has a very strong commitment to Open Source Software, open governance, open practices and OER.

The OERF operates in a very transparent way.

The OERF use of multiple means of open in it's business model has the potential to generate [compound benefits](#).

The OERF is committed to being a charitable education organization. While it has received Foundation grants, the OERF finances the OERu initiative largely through membership fees that it charges partner institutions who join the OERu. This keeps the OERF out of the many possible open business models partner institutions may choose to adopt.

The OERF open business model is supported not just through revenue but through social capital, largely in the form of faculty and staff time from partner institutions. The OERF relies on this human capital for design, development and implementation of OERu academic offerings. Currently the academic offerings of OERu are spartan and actual student enrollment low suggesting a greater investment of human capital is necessary.

The OERF open business model is supported not just through revenue and social capital but also through OER. Partner institutions provide OER and the OERu utilizes partner OER and OER on the open web as inputs, designing, developing and further enhancing those inputs into its own OERu output course and program offerings, similarly licensed as OER. This extensive use of Creative Commons makes OERF unique.

The OERF has three OERu customers - 1. Institutions, 2. Learners, and 3. Educators. To date it has done a great job of attracting partner institutions with over thirty-two partners from five continents. However, there are few students enrolled suggesting there is a critical need to engage learners directly not just as recipients of academic offerings but in the design, development, and use of OERu itself. Significantly more learners are needed to test out the value propositions OERu is providing.

OERF partner engagement, communication and support model open governance and open management practices with partner institutions. However, relationship building, engagement, channels of communication, and support for learners has not been developed as equally strong.

OERu Partner Institution Open Business Models

The OERu is interesting from an open business models perspective because it has over 30 partner institutions. In August and September 2015 Creative Commons led open business model workshops for OERu partner institutions in Oceania and in North America inviting them to define an open business model that works for their institution. The OERu initiative requires an ecosystem of open business models that work together in a mutually beneficial way. During the workshops partner institutions generated their own open business model canvases. These were then aggregated into a single open business model representative of the perspectives of all OERu partners:

Analysis

The open business models of OERu partner institutions diversifies customer segments for most by focusing on learners who have been traditionally excluded.

Full realization of OERu value propositions may come from OERu offerings being dual purpose serving the needs of existing partner institution learners as well as new learners.

OERu's social good is a compelling reason for partners to join. Some partners see their participation as purely philanthropic generating no new revenue.

Customer self-service, minimal academic support service provision, and OERF provided infrastructure make participation in OERu low cost. However, low student uptake and completion may require these aspects of the business model to be rethought.

The cost structure for participation is based on memberships and staff/course contributions. Relatively low membership fees make joining OERu within the reach of almost all institutions.

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Partner institution commitment to contribute staff time at fractions of an FTE have cumulative potential but may make actual provision of effort difficult to allocate and sustain. Cumulative FTE of staff time is low relative to the value propositions being pursued.

Marketing and channels of communication to attract, engage, and track student participation are absent.

Revenue generation is forecasted as a fee-for-service charge to students for formal assessment and credentialing, conversion of free learners into full time for fee learners, and pay as you go tutorial services. These revenue sources are more theoretical than actual at this point.

Motivations for partner participation in OERu vary. For some it is less about new learners or revenue and instead is about learning how openness works and developing new practices and innovations associated with open education.

OERu offerings are entirely based on OER with content coming from partner institutions and the open web. Extensive use of Creative Commons licenses and many other forms of openness including open design, open planning, open pedagogies, and use of open source software technology infrastructure make OERu a model open business.

The many different ways of being open make OERu incredibly transparent but it also creates navigation complexity and overhead for partners.

Converting OER into actual offerings requires partner participation in designing, developing and enhancing them to work in the OERu context. This creates additional workload and a parallel but separate process from regular partner institution workflow. This is both a source of innovation and a bottleneck.

OERu is a model of multiple means of open and a bit of an experiment in how the many ways of open successfully combine into a new open business model.
